Preface

The purpose of these lectures is to help students, ministers and pastors, and other Church leaders and workers, to think theologically about the Gospel, so that they may get a firmer grip upon its content for their various ministries. The material presented here relates to earlier addresses on the Mediation of Christ given at Summer Schools of Theology in St. Andrews, Scotland and Princeton, New Jersey, which were naturally adapted to the circumstances, conditions and needs of the people who attended them. This book represents an extended form of the Didsbury Lectures which it was my privilege to deliver in The British Isles Nazarene College in Manchester during October 1982.
